INTRODUCTION OF GUESTS

The chair recognized Representative Raymond who introduced Carlos Villarreal and members of his family and friends.

ADDRESS BY REPRESENTATIVE ALONZO

The chair recognized Representative Alonzo who addressed the house, speaking as follows:

Members, I rise to say a few words to commemorate a special date. In fact, today is a holiday. A few years ago several representatives and senators passed a bill to designate this day as a holiday that state workers could choose as their holiday. Today is the holiday of the birthday of Cesar Chavez. Throughout the country, throughout the state, throughout cities across the state, this gentleman is being honored in marches like they did with 15,000 people in San Antonio. They are doing one in Corpus Christi. This Saturday they are going to do another march in Fort Worth to commemorate his birthday.

Members, this guy is a very important person for the whole country. As a matter of fact, he's been honored nationwide, as well. Why is he being honored? Because one of the things like we did a few minutes ago, we recognize individuals for what they've done. We just honored a person from a city. This person we're honoring in the state and country, Cesar Chavez. Now why do we honor him, members? We honor him because through his life he organized farmworkers. This past week I was watching his movie, *Cesar Chavez*, and let me tell you members, let me tell you how important it was to organize farmworkers. We here have unions come and lobby us for issues with workers and wages. Back then, when he was organizing, there were no rights for farmworkers, there was no health care for farmworkers, you were on your own. There's a gentleman from my hometown, Tomás Villanueva, a writer who passed, who would write about the lives of farmworkers; how mothers, pregnant, would work, working in the

fields, no health care, no restrooms. The conditions where they lived were horrible. Here in this legislative process we passed laws to get rid of the short-handled hoe because people have to bend over to work and hurt their backs.

Members, this commenoration is because he sought to advance La Causa/The Movement, through nonviolent means—through strikes, pickets, and boycotts. On several occasions he also undertook lengthy fasts to draw public attention to the farmworker struggle. And members, whereas Mr. Chavez continually led the UFW until his death on April 23, 1993, where more than 50,000 people showed up throughout the nation, that gathered to mourn his funeral. And whereas since that time, numerous schools, streets, scholarships, monuments, buildings, and parks have been named in his memory. A number of U.S. cities have been issued annual celebrations in tribute to his life, and several states, including the State of Texas, have declared his birthday, March 31, a state holiday. In 1994, Mr. Chavez was also posthumously awarded the nation's highest honor, the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

And whereas Cesar Chavez devoted to the world his life to the pursuit of social and economic justice, this house, on February 19, passed a resolution to unanimously commemorate. So members, I ask you to take a moment and remember this gentleman for the work that he did, but also as we commemorate, we do not forget. And of course I can tell you personally, I was also a farmworker, my mom was also working in the fields, and so I also take this, as a personal hero, that we commemorate his life. Members, let's give a round of applause to commemorate Cesar Chavez.

CSHB 1 ON SECOND READING (by Otto)

CSHB 1, General Appropriations Bill.

Amendment No. 1

Representative Otto offered the following amendment to CSHB 1:

Floor Packet Page No. 3

Amend **CSHB 1** as follows:

(1) On page XI-7, under "Public Education, Texas Education Agency", add the following new item:

Contingency General Revenue Appropriation for School Finance Legislation, **HB 1759**, which improves equity, reduces recapture, and increases the state share: \$800,000,000

(2) On page III-18 in the bill pattern for the Texas Education Agency amend the following rider:

66. Foundation School Program Funds for Improving Equity, Reducing Recapture, and Increasing State Share.: Allocation of Funds to the Basic Allotment. Included in amounts appropriated above in Strategy A.1.1, FSP-Equalized Operations, is \$1,108,100,000 in each fiscal year of the 2016 17 biennium \$1,105,700,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$1,107,000,000 in fiscal year 2017 out of the Foundation School Fund No. 193 to be allocated to school districts and charter schools through formula the Basic Allotment or other

changes to the Foundation School Program to be determined by the Eighty-Fourth Legislature for the purposes of improving equity, reducing recapture, and increasing the state share of the Foundation School Program.

(3) On page III-5, in the bill pattern for the Texas Education Agency, modify the following rider:

3. Foundation School Program Funding. Out of the funds appropriated above, a total of \$20,788,300,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$20,629,200,000 in fiscal year 2017 shall represent the sum-certain appropriation to the Foundation School Program. The total appropriation may not exceed the sum-certain amount. This appropriation includes allocations under Chapters 41, 42 and 46 of the Texas Education Code.

Formula Funding: The Commissioner shall make allocations to local school districts under Chapters 41, 42 and 46 based on the March 2015 estimates of average daily attendance and local district tax rates as determined by the Legislative Budget Board and the final tax year 2014 property values. Property values, and the estimates of local tax collections on which they are based, shall be increased by 5.71 percent for tax year 2015 and by 5.30 percent for tax year 2016.

For purposes of distributing the Foundation School Program basic tier state aid appropriated above and in accordance with §42.101 of the Texas Education Code, the Basic Allotment is established at \$5,040 \$5,213 in fiscal year 2016 and \$5,218 in fiscal year 2017.

For purposes of distributing the Foundation School Program enrichment tier state aid appropriated above and in accordance with §41.002(a)(2) and §42.302(a-1)(1) of the Texas Education Code, the Guaranteed Yield is \$72.94 in fiscal year 2016 and \$76.75 in fiscal year 2017.

For purposes of distributing the Foundation School Program Additional State Aid for Tax Reduction appropriated above and in accordance with 42.2516(i), the percentage applied for purposes of 42.2516(b)(1), 42.2516(b)(2), and 42.2516(d)(1) is 92.63 percent for the 2015-16 and the 2016-17 school years.

Out of amounts appropriated above and allocated by this rider to the Foundation School Program, no funds are appropriated for the New Instructional Facilities Allotment under §42.158 of the Texas Education Code.

Notwithstanding any other provision of this Act, the Texas Education Agency may make transfers as appropriate between Strategy A.1.1, FSP-Equalized Operations, and Strategy A.1.2, FSP-Equalized Facilities. The TEA shall notify the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor of any such transfers at least 15 days prior to the transfer.

The Texas Education Agency shall submit reports on the prior month's expenditures on programs described by this rider no later than the 20th day of each month to the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's Office in a format determined by the Legislative Budget Board in cooperation with the agency.

Contingent on the Commissioner of Education identifying a budget surplus of Foundation School Program funds appropriated above in either fiscal year of the 2016-17 biennium, the Commissioner shall notify the Legislative Budget Board and the Office of the Governor in writing no later than 30 calendar days before taking any action pursuant to the Education Code §§7.062, 42.2517, 42.2521, 42.2522, 42.2523, or 42.2524.

(4) On page VII-29, in the bill pattern for the Texas Department of Transportation, modify the following rider:

44. Proposition 1 Appropriations. Amounts appropriated above in Strategy I.1.1, Proposition 1 2014, from State Highway Fund No. 006 - Proposition 1, 2014, reflect estimated revenue transfers to the State Highway Fund pursuant to Article III, Section 49-g(c-1) of the Texas Constitution (estimated to be \$1,216,274,000 in fiscal year 2016 and \$1,197,393,000 in fiscal year 2017) to be used for constructing, maintaining, and acquiring rights-of-way for nontolled public roadways. The funds appropriated above in Strategy I.1.1, Proposition 1, 2014, shall be allocated for the following purposes: The final appropriation amount and allocation of these funds for the 2016 17 biennium is to be determined by the Eighty Fourth Legislature, Regular Session.

<u>a. 45 percent for mobility and added capacity projects in urban areas to</u> decrease congestion and increase the safe and efficient movement of traffic (estimated to be \$547,323,300 for fiscal year 2016 and \$538,826,850 for fiscal year 2017);

b. 25 percent for projects that improve regional connectivity along strategic corridors in rural areas of the state (estimated to be \$304,068,500 for fiscal year 2016 and \$299,348,250 for fiscal year 2017);

c. 20 percent for statewide maintenance and preservation projects (estimated to be \$243,254,800 for fiscal year 2016 and \$239,478,600 for fiscal year 2017); and

d. 10 percent for roadway safety and maintenance projects in areas of the state impacted by increased oil and gas production activity (estimated to be \$121,627,400 for fiscal year 2016 and \$119,739,300 for fiscal year 2017).

(5) On page V-44, in the bill pattern for the Department of Public Safety, modify the following rider:

50. Limitation on Appropriations: 23 Week Recruit Schools

a) As used in this section:

1) "training school" and "recruit school" include any school or other training program operated by or for the benefit of the Department of Public Safety ("department") for a purpose which may include training a trooper who has been employed by the department for fewer than 52 weeks.

2) "new trooper" means a trooper employed by the department for fewer than 52 weeks.

b) No f-Funds appropriated by this Act may be used to pay any cost or expense that may be directly or indirectly related to the operation of a an eight-week training school or recruit school that provides a new trooper with fewer than 23 weeks of training. only to graduate and employ a total of 250 troopers from such eight-week recruit schools.

c) The number of additional troopers referenced above in section b is reduced by the number of troopers graduated from eight-week recruit schools from April 1, 2015 to August 31, 2015.

ed) Employees completing the 23 week or longer recruit school shall graduate and shall be compensated only as entry level troopers.

(6) On page V-44-45, in the bill pattern of the Department of Public Safety, modify the following rider:

51. Funding to Add 300 New Troopers. Included in the general revenue appropriations made above in Strategy B.1.5, Recruitment, Retention and Support, is \$41,717,187 in fiscal year 2016 and \$63,282,813 in fiscal year 2017 to fund the recruitment, training and support of 300 new troopers by the end of fiscal year 2017. Included in the 300 total troopers is a minimum of 250 troopers who shall be stationed in the border region. In this section, border region is defined in Article IX, Section 7.11 (b) (1), (2), and (3) of this Act. The appropriations are subject to the following provisions:

a) The appropriations identified in this rider are intended to fund full length recruit schools may be used to fund eight-week recruit schools but may only be used to graduate and employ no more than 250 troopers from such recruit schools., where "recruit school" is defined as a 23 week recruit school graduating entry level probationary troopers. If the Department of Public Safety has graduated and employed 250 troopers through the use of eight-week recruit schools, the appropriations identified in this rider may only be used to fund recruit schools 23 weeks or longer in length graduating entry-level probationary troopers. Funds identified in this rider may be used to fund eight-week recruit schools and also those 23 weeks or longer concurrently.

b) The appropriations identified in this rider are in addition to, and separate from, the appropriations made above in Strategy F.1.6, Training Academy and Development, to fund six recruit schools.

c) The agency shall submit a report to the Legislative Budget Board by no later than December 1, 2015 detailing the agency's plan to recruit, train and support 300 new troopers by the end of fiscal year 2017. This report shall include a section on the agency's total trooper recruitment plan for the 2016-17 biennium, including the troopers expected to result from the six recruit schools noted above in (b).

d) The agency shall submit quarterly reports to the Legislative Budget Board detailing the cumulative progress attained toward the goal of graduating 300 entry-level troopers by the end of fiscal year 2017.

e) \$41,717,187 in fiscal year 2016 and \$63,282,813 in fiscal year 2017 appropriated in Strategy B.1.5, Recruitment, Retention and Support, is subject to the prior approval authority provided by Article XVI, Section 69, Texas Constitution, and in the event the agency is not in a position to graduate 300 new troopers using the funds identified in this rider, the Legislative Budget Board may direct the Comptroller of Public Accounts to reduce the agency's appropriations by an amount proportionate to the difference between the targeted number and actual number of troopers graduated.

Amendment No. 2

Representative Otto offered the following amendment to Amendment No. 1:

Amend Floor Amendment No. 1 by Otto to **CSHB 1**, by adding the following:

On page I-58 of the Trusteed Programs Within the Office of the Governor bill pattern add the following appropriately numbered riders:

Contingency Appropriations for the Moving Image Industry Incentive Program. Included in amounts appropriated above is \$11,000,000 in general revenue in each fiscal year of the 2016-17 biennium, in Strategy A.1.4, Film and Music Marketing, to for the Moving Image Industry Incentive Program (MIIIP) as authorized under Chapter 485, Government Code, contingent upon sufficient revenue certified by the Comptroller of Public Accounts. The Comptroller must certify that sufficient revenue is generated from the moving image industry in Texas to offset the cost of the appropriations, including but not limited to tax revenues generated from wages paid to industry employees, new jobs created in the state, and other non-tax exempt taxes paid by the industry to the state's general revenue fund and other funds, as appropriate.

Contingency Appropriation for Film and Music Marketing. Included in amounts appropriated above, contingent on a projection by the Comptroller of Public Accounts that the collection of the Hotel Occupancy Tax will be in excess of \$559,000,000 in fiscal year 2016 and in excess of \$592,000,000 in fiscal year 2017, as contained in the Comptroller of Public Accounts' January 2015 Biennial Revenue Estimate for the 2016-17 biennium, is excess Hotel Occupancy Tax revenue, not to exceed \$20,833,176 out of general revenue, in each fiscal year of the 2016-17 biennium, to Strategy C.1.3, Film and Music Marketing for grants.

A finding of fact shall be issued, and the Legislative Budget Board and the Governor's Office of Budget Planning and Policy shall be notified, by the Comptroller of Public Accounts if it projects the collection of the Hotel Occupancy Tax will be in excess of the amounts contained in the January 2015 Biennial Revenue Estimate for the 2016-17 biennium, for fiscal years 2016 and 2017 respectively.

Contingent on **HB 424**, which provides full-day prekindergarten for eligible children under Section 29.153, Education Code: \$829,908,513 in fiscal year 2016 and \$837,431,047 in fiscal year 2017

Representative Geren raised a point of order against further consideration of Amendment No. 97 under Rule 8, Section 4 of the House Rules on the grounds that the amendment would change general law.

The chair sustained the point of order and submitted the following statement:

Representative Geren raised a point of order against further consideration of Amendment No. 97 under Rule 8, Section 4 of the House Rules on the grounds that the amendment would change general law. The point of order is sustained.

Under Rule 8, Section 4 of the House Rules, "A general law may not be changed by the provisions in an appropriations bill." Explanatory note 2 to Rule 8, Section 4 of the House Rules states further that "a rider to an appropriations bill may detail, restrict, or limit the expenditure of appropriated funds, but may not enact or amend general law." The amendment by Representative Coleman would have required the Legislative Budget Board's approval before "an agency may use funds appropriated to implement management actions which defund or alter programs in a manner inconsistent with the funding considerations, when the funds were appropriated without the enactment of specific legislation by the Eighty-Fourth Legislature, Regular Session." In this instance, the amendment would have given ambiguous and unspecified actors within a Health and Human Services agency the authority to use appropriated funds in order to implement management actions under certain circumstances. Furthermore, this amendment's provision regarding the limitation of appropriated funds without prior approval under authority already granted under Chapter 531 of the Government Code is in violation of general law. See TEX. GOV'T CODE ANN. §§ 531.005, .0055(e)(1) (West 2003). Because the amendment would have impermissibly effected a change in general law, the point of order is sustained. See id.; Rule 8, Section 4 of the House Rules; 83 H.J. Reg. 1351-1352 (2013) (Cortez point of order on Amendment No. 158); 83 H.J. Reg. 1360-1361 (2013) (C. Turner point of order on Amendment No. 175).

Additionally, it is the intent of the legislature that among this eligible population, persons who are homeless, at risk of homelessness, residents of permanent supportive housing or recognized as high-users of emergency care services be given specific consideration in the design and outreach of the state plan amendment authorized under this subsection.

(b) Contingent on federal approval of a state plan amendment under Subsection (a) of this section and the prior written approval from the governor and the Legislative Budget Board, the Health and Human Services Commission may use funds appropriated above in Strategy B.1.2, Disability-related Eligibility Group (page II-71), to provide services under the state plan amendment.

(c) To request approval under Subsection (b) of this section, the Health and Human Services Commission shall submit a written request to the governor and the Legislative Budget Board, and provide a copy of the request to the comptroller. The request must include:

(1) a copy of the federal approval of the state plan amendment authorized under Subsection (a) of this section;

(2) the estimated number of health teams that will provide services;

(3) the estimated fiscal impact for each fiscal year of the fiscal biennium beginning September 1, 2015, including the impact on methods of finance the implementation of the amendment will have on services and providers in the Medicaid program, including any projected savings anticipated from implementation of the amendment; and

(4) an estimate of provider performance levels and, where relevant, a comparison to performance targets specified in this Act.

(d) The Legislative Budget Board shall review a request submitted under Subsection (c) of this section and deliver the board's analysis to the governor, the lieutenant governor, the chair of the House Appropriations Committee, the chair of the Senate Finance Committee, and the speaker of the house of representatives. A request is considered approved unless the board or the governor issues a written disapproval not later than the 15th business day after the date the board delivers its analysis under this subsection.

AMENDMENT NO. 133 - REMARKS

REPRESENTATIVE SCHUBERT: Members, I've had the distinct honor of representing HD 13 for a grand total of 28 days. I rise today in defense of higher education in rural Texas. Like many of my colleagues here in the house, I am fortunate to have a world class community college system in my district. In my district that system is Blinn College. Three of the four campuses of Blinn College are in my district, in fact, Blinn is the only institution of higher education in all of district 13. In the grand scheme of our debate today, this may seem like a small issue, but to my district this is incredibly important. The rider mandates how Blinn College's board can allocate their funding by campus and leaves no flexibility for future use. In essence, it takes away the local board's control and replaces it with a mandate from the state. There's already a bill working through the process that handles this, and what I am asking for is that we allow time for the local board to work through that.

From the day I was sworn in, I've worked with Mr. Raney and Blinn to try to find a solution to this situation. I am 110 percent committed to continuing the work on this issue, both in session and in the interim, and in fact, the level of communication between Representative Raney's office and Blinn has increased dramatically since my four weeks here. I agree that changes need to be made. I also believe that we've made positive progress on this matter. All that I am asking for is the ability—

REPRESENTATIVE RANEY: Mr. Schubert, I want to first express my appreciation for you coming to numerous meetings that we've had concerning this issue of the distribution of funds from Blinn. I have a few questions I would like to ask you and I—if you don't mind.

SCHUBERT: Yes, sir.

RANEY: Are you aware that I have been trying to gain access for financial information from Blinn for two years, and I had to resort to open records requests to get that information?

SCHUBERT: Yes, sir, I am aware and unfortunately that is the case.

RANEY: You don't think this is acceptable then to our institution that receives state funding then, do you?

SCHUBERT: I completely agree that it's an unfortunate situation, and you and I have both been working toward greater communication and greater transparency in this situation.

RANEY: That's correct. Do you know that out of Blinn's total income, from Brenham, Schulenburg, and Sealy that accounts for 22 percent of the revenue from Blinn and 42 percent of the expenses while the Bryan revenue's account for 79 percent of revenue and 58 percent of expenses?

SCHUBERT: I did realize that. One of the things that I think about, the community college system is there to educate its students in all of those systems despite where their classes are located.

RANEY: Agreed. Do you know that in the last eight years, a 300-bed dorm, an agricultural building, a performing arts center, and an administration building were built on the Brenham campus in an effort to gain more students?

SCHUBERT: Yes, I am.

RANEY: Do you realize that within the last 20 years, the number of students at Blinn in Brenham has remained stagnant at about 23-2400?

SCHUBERT: I believe that's true as well.

RANEY: Do you realize that the Brenham campus loses approximately \$400 million a year?

SCHUBERT: I was provided with those numbers as well. Yes, sir.

RANEY: Do you know that Blinn has one of the lowest tax rates of any community college in the whole State of Texas?

SCHUBERT: Yes, sir.

RANEY: Do you know that the students of the Bryan campus are responsible for \$12.6 million of the \$13.1 million in net revenue?

SCHUBERT: I am aware.

RANEY: Given all of this, do you think that Blinn has decided to raise tuition rates by \$3 on in-district students and by \$10 on out-of-district students, raising the in-district tuition to \$45 and the out-of-district tuition to \$102?

SCHUBERT: Yes, I've heard that's the decision that the board made.

RANEY: And do you realize that the students at the Bryan campus have been stepping on themselves, and parking in mud lots, and not having enough facilities to deal with their activities on campus?

SCHUBERT: I completely agree that there are facility issues at the Bryan campus and that's why the board has recently purchased around 100 acres in Brazos County and they're going to build a new state-of-the-art facility for the Bryan campus.

RANEY: I agree with that, and I am proud that they're doing that, I just think it's been a long time coming. Do you recall that the Blinn—the acting president of Blinn—when I asked, before the Higher Education Committee last Wednesday, to explain the allocation of funds from state funds and she said it's not your place?

SCHUBERT: I was there for that hearing and unfortunately that was her answer, and my goal in this situation just as we've stated, has been working on increasing the transparency and the lines of communication in this situation.

RANEY: Do you also recall that during that same testimony one of the active board members of Blinn acknowledged that this was—that the Blinn board had failed their fiduciary responsibility to allocate our resources properly?

SCHUBERT: That is correct and as I stated, we all agree that changes need to be made and the Blinn board has acknowledged their shortcomings and stated they are working on that. What we're simply asking for is let the local decision work out, with your input obviously, but not have a mandate from the state involved in this.

RANEY: Mr. Schubert, I would love for the local people to work that out, but if history repeats itself, they have not been willing to act. Do you realize that last week we asked the board to provide me with ways we could change my bill, **HB 1903**, and I have still not heard from them?

SCHUBERT: Yes, sir, and I have been working with them, as you know, to communicate with them the severity of the situation and I am hoping that they can continue to work, but I am aware that there has been some communication issues.

RANEY: The communication has been one way.

AMENDMENT NO. 133 - REMARKS

REPRESENTATIVE RANEY: I think we've had adequate discussion and I would hope that the body would vote with me to table this bill.

REPRESENTATIVE C. TURNER: Representative Raney, we heard a bill that you have that is similar to this rider, I believe in the Higher Education Committee, last Wednesday, I believe, is that right?

RANEY: Yes, sir.

C. TURNER: We heard several hours of testimony on that piece of legislation, did we not?

RANEY: That's correct.

C. TURNER: Is my memory correct that the Blinn assistant president basically said it wasn't really the legislator's place to get involved in how state funds are being allocated?

RANEY: That's correct.

C. TURNER: Okay. I think we heard some testimony from a number of students and certainly from faculty members from the Blinn campus in Bryan, who talked repeatedly about, you know, being in overcrowded situations, having to sit on the floor to study, and not having adequate facilities that they need for a campus of, I believe is about 15,000 students, is that right?

RANEY: That is correct.

C. TURNER: Okay. Have you tried to deal with this issue in your district without filing legislation or coming to the legislature?

RANEY: I have been trying to deal with this for nearly three years.

C. TURNER: How many years?

RANEY: Three.

REPRESENTATIVE MORRISON: Representative Raney, I know from testimony that a lot of your concerns are related to the fiscal aspects associated with the issues that you are looking to address, is that correct?

RANEY: Yes, ma'am, that's correct.

MORRISON: What is the tuition responsibility for your students both in and out-of-district now?

RANEY: In-district, I believe they're going to be \$45 and out-of-district they're \$102. That's what they voted on recently.

MORRISON: Recently. And Representative Raney, at the committee hearing this last week, I heard testimony regarding this issue while I was, of course, attending the committee hearing. Have you received the information you requested from that hearing to this point?

RANEY: No, ma'am, I have not.

Representative Raney moved to table Amendment No. 133.

SCHUBERT: I ask you to vote no on the motion to table.

REPRESENTATIVE STEPHENSON: We are fixing to vote on something to table a deal that should be a local control thing of a college. I happen to be very involved in a college for a lot of years, and I think we usually can handle those. I would appreciate that the folks out here would understand that this is your problem, we need to be not fixing it for you.

From funds appropriated above, \$5,000,000 in general revenue funds in each fiscal year in Strategy B.1.1 State Grants to Local Entities, shall be used for a Border Death Humanitarian and Identification Fund, henceforth referred to as 'fund', to assist in the prevention of migrant deaths along and within 100 miles of the Texas-Mexico border. This fund will provide for grants to counties and municipalities within this 100-mile zone to support county and municipal border and migrant death prevention efforts. This fund will also provide grants to counties, municipalities, and universities for programs aimed at recovering bodies and identifying deceased migrants.

(1) The legislature will appropriate \$8,000,000 for the initial creation of this fund.

(A) 9,000,000 of this fund should be appropriated to fund two years of regular grant funding.

(B) \$1,000,000 of this fund should be appropriated to fund two years of emergency grant funding.

(2) This fund will be administered by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

(A) The director will appoint a Border Death Humanitarian Grant Coordinator to develop and manage grant application processes, determine grant recipients, evaluate the effectiveness of the programmatic applications of grant money, and facilitate coordination and information sharing between grant recipients. The Border Death Humanitarian Identification Grant Coordinator will report to the director.

(B) The director will also appoint a Border Death Humanitarian Identification Advisor to assist the Border Death Humanitarian Identification Grant Coordinator in evaluating the technical aspects of grant proposals, coordinating grantees around best practices, in writing required annual reports, and in assisting the Border Death Humanitarian Identification Grant Coordinator with other duties as necessary.

(C) The Director must appoint the Border Death Humanitarian Grant Coordinator, Border Death Humanitarian Technical Advisor, and Border Death Humanitarian Fund Manager no later than October 15, 2015.

(3) DPS cannot use monies appropriated to the Border Death Humanitarian Identification Fund to provide for the management and oversight of the fund and related grant programs.

(b) The Border Death Humanitarian Grant Coordinator, in consultation with the Director, with university and community experts in border deaths, and with relevant sheriffs and county judges, will develop and publicize both Border Death Humanitarian and Identification regular and emergency grant application processes no later than January 1, 2016.

(1) Both grant application processes should be developed to favor grant requests from border locations with high numbers of border related and migrant deaths.

(2) Both grant application processes must provide funds for programs that address either migrant death prevention, or corpse recovery, and identification.

(3) Both grant application processes should be developed to favor grant requests from entities that can provide private or federal matching funds.

(4) While lead applicants for grant funding must be counties, municipalities, or universities, applications that would subcontract with 501(c)(3) non-profits or other community based groups are acceptable to be funded through these grants.

(5) Inclusion of subcontractors in a grant application should be viewed favorably if the inclusion of these subcontractors allows a greater scope of activity to be performed or greater efficiency in carrying out the grant.

(6) Grant application processes should be reviewed annually, and a revised process publicized no later than January 1 of each subsequent year.

(c) The Border Death Prevention Grant Coordinator should begin accepting regular grant applications no later than January 15 of each year, should cease accepting grant applications on February 22 of each year, and should begin issuing grants no later than March 1 of each year.

(d) The Border Death Prevention Grant Coordinator should begin accepting emergency grant applications no later than January 15 of each year. Applications for emergency grants may be accepted year-round.

(1) Emergency grant funding should be capped at a maximum of \$35,000 per application.

(2) The Border Death Prevention Grant Coordinator should issue a determination of the emergency grant request's funding status no later than 15 business days after receipt of the request.

(3) All other considerations regarding grant applications as described above should also be applied to judging emergency grant requests.

(e) The Border Death Prevention Grant Coordinator should establish a monthly conference call between grant recipients to facilitate interaction between grantees around coordinating their efforts and to develop and promote practices in border and migrant death prevention no later than May 15, 2016.

(f) The Border Death Prevention Grant Coordinator should establish a quarterly conference call between grant recipients to facilitate interaction between grantees around coordinating their efforts and to develop and promote best practices in recovering, identifying, and repatriating corpses no later than July 8, 2016.

(g) The Border Death Prevention Grant Coordinator should, no later than September 1 of each year, issue an annual report on the activities of the fund, including information on:

(1) what programs were supported with fund monies,

(2) evaluations on the success and shortcomings of funded programs,

(3) discussion of efforts to promote best practices in border and migrant death prevention,

(4) discussion of efforts to promote best practices on the recovery, processing, DNA sampling and DNA database storage of border related deaths, with particular emphasis on unidentified human remains,

(5) discussion of efforts to promote best practices in corpse repatriation,

(6) and recommendations on the future funding of the fund and its efforts by the legislature.

(5) This report should be made publicly available by DPS as well as should copies of the report be provided to the membership of each standing committee in the legislature with jurisdiction over homeland security.

(b) Not later than August 31 of each year of the state fiscal biennium ending August 31, 2017, the Department of Public Safety shall issue a report regarding the activities of recipients of grants awarded as provided by Subsection (a) of this provision. The department shall make the report publicly available on the department's Internet website and shall provide copies of the report to each standing committee of the legislature with jurisdiction over homeland security. The report must include information concerning:

(1) the operations of local governmental entities that received a grant as provided by Subsection (a) of this provision, including the successes and shortcomings of each operation;

(2) efforts to promote best practices in the prevention of border-related and migrant deaths;

(3) efforts to promote best practices in the recovery, processing, DNA sampling, and DNA database storage of remains of migrants in border-related deaths, with particular emphasis on unidentified human remains;

(4) efforts to promote best practices in the repatriation of remains of migrants; and

(5) recommendations to the legislature regarding whether the legislature should continue to fund the grants as provided by this provision.

From these funds, \$1,800,000 in each fiscal year in general revenue shall be used for aquatic invasive species management, including zebra mussels and other animal species, with \$150,000 of those funds in each fiscal year provided to the Cypress Valley Navigation District for use in management of giant salvinia and other aquatic invasive species at Caddo Lake. Any unexpended balances of these amounts as of August 31, 2016, are appropriated for the same purpose in the fiscal year

beginning September 1, 2016. Use of the Federal Funds referenced above is contingent upon receipt of a federal boating access grant under the Sportfish Restoration Act by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

AMENDMENT NO. 227 - REMARKS

REPRESENTATIVE Y. DAVIS: This is an amendment that would allow us to reduce from general revenue \$125.2 million that was deposited from the State-Federal National Mortgage Settlement. This amendment allows us to transfer it to the Department of Housing and Community Affairs. Five of the largest market services agreed to a \$25 billion settlement of the joint State-Federal National Mortgage Settlement where 49 states participated in it. Those settlement funds were supposed to be used to deal with the issue when we had predatory lending. So in our community there was predatory lending, and this settlement was part of an agreement to put back in the community, to provide housing—those that lost their houses during this time. We currently don't know what the money was used for, but it was very specific when the settlement came out. In fact, California is being sued now because they used the money to pay down their debt. This amendment is simply to provide this money back into the agency to do what it was supposed to do as part of a federal settlement.

Amendment No. 228

Representative Y. Davis offered the following amendment to Amendment No. 227:

Amend Amendment No. 227 to **CSHB 1** by Y. Davis (page 278, prefiled amendment packet) on page 1 by striking the text of the amendment and substituting the following:

Amend **CSHB 1** by reducing all undedicated general revenue appropriations provided by this Act proportionally across all items of appropriation by a total of \$125.2 million for the state fiscal biennium and increase the appropriations from the general revenue fund for the state fiscal biennium to the Department of Housing and Community Affairs by an equal amount for the purpose of assisting certain organizations or governmental entities to make residential mortgage loans to residents of certain neighborhoods. Adjust totals and methods of financing accordingly.

Y. DAVIS: This amendment to the amendment just reduces all undedicated general revenue appropriations to get us to the \$125.2 million for the state fiscal biennium and increase the appropriations going to the Department of Housing and Community Affairs. It's a perfecting amendment to basically say that we would take it out of undedicated general revenue appropriations.

REPRESENTATIVE MILES: Representative Davis, let me make sure I understand what you just said. The State of Texas was awarded \$125 million from the federal government?

Y. DAVIS: That's correct.

MILES: For a predatory lending lawsuit?

Y. DAVIS: That's correct.

MILES: From the federal government, meaning under the Obama administration?

Y. DAVIS: That's correct. It was a \$25 billion settlement among 49 states and it was aimed to address the issues for so many families and homeowners who lost their houses and homes due to predatory lending and backed loans.

MILES: The State of Texas received, and took in, and cashed the check from the federal government of the Obama administration?

Y. DAVIS: My understanding is they did get the money. We asked LBB about it, and they said that the state portion was \$134.6 million—

MILES: The State of Texas cashed a check from President Obama's administration?

Y. DAVIS: They cashed a check from the federal government, yes.

MILES: From Obama's administration?

Y. DAVIS: From President Obama's administration.

MILES: We know not where the money went?

Y. DAVIS: It says \$125.2 million was deposited to the general revenue fund, the remainder \$9.4 million was deposited to the general revenue dedicated judicial fund, an additional \$1 million for attorneys' fees was deposited to general revenue and appropriated to the Office of the Attorney General pursuant to Rider 8.

MILES: But when the money was sent to the State of Texas, it was sent here specifically to go to where?

Y. DAVIS: The settlement money was to go to consumers to provide consumer relief for those that experienced this kind of predatory lending.

MILES: Predatory lending. This happened all over the State of Texas, is that correct?

Y. DAVIS: That is correct.

MILES: And we know not where the rest of that money went?

Y. DAVIS: That's correct.

MILES: Your amendment is simply trying to—we know that the money came, we know that the money is here, we're just trying to prevent the State of Texas from a possible lawsuit, such as what California has gone through, that could cost this state more money.

Y. DAVIS: That's exactly right. The other part is, we have people in Texas who suffered. This is a way that we can at least address the concerns. Many of them lost their homes, many families lost lots of their resources as a result of this lending practice, and this is our attempt to make us be honorable and putting the money back in place for what it was designed for. That's what this settlement was about.

MILES: And if we don't do that—my last question, gentlelady. If we don't do that, we could be subject to a lawsuit that could cost the State of Texas more money in damages as well as legal fees, is that correct?

Y. DAVIS: I can tell you that, based on our research, California currently is in a lawsuit because they chose to use the money to pay down debt, which is not what the fund was for, and they're being sued at this time. I'm just simply trying to make sure that we put the money back in the treasury [inaudible] to the department that has a responsibility to address the issue that was addressed in the federal settlement.

MILES: And just so I didn't get anything misunderstood. This state, the great State of Texas, received and cashed a check from the Obama administration?

Y. DAVIS: That's correct.

Amendment No. 228 was adopted.

REPRESENTATIVE GONZALES: I thank Representative Davis for bringing this to our attention. There are some problems with this amendment as it is drafted. Number one, the take. Members, to get that \$125.2 million comes from across the board, a bunch of different agencies. That's the take in our take-and-put rule. We're taking it from across the board, a bunch of different agencies. The next issue is that we're putting it into the Department of Housing and Community Affairs. Members, they have absolutely no authority to address the issue in the agency where that money is going. So then what happens? The money just sits there. And after it just sits there, because they have no authority to work with it, that money then gets swept once again. This needs legislation to actually fix what's happening. Ms. Davis has legislation that sends it to a SDSI agency, members, but since SDSI agencies are outside of the bill pattern, we can't even appropriate that money there. So we've got a lot of different things happening here and for that, Mr. Speaker, I—

MILES: Let me go through this once again. You agree that we received this money from the Obama administration, the \$125 million?

GONZALES: That's correct, sir.

MILES: You agree. Have we spent some of this \$125 million that was sent here for predatory—as a result of a predatory lending lawsuit?

GONZALES: I'm sorry did you say that we spent it?

MILES: Have we cashed that check?

GONZALES: Cashed, I'm not sure about spent it, though.

MILES: Did we cash that check?

GONZALES: We cashed the check, yes, sir.

MILES: And that check was earmarked when it came from the Obama administration for predatory lending corrections. Is that correct?

GONZALES: That is what I have been told, yes, sir.

MILES: You're aware that the State of California has been sued for not adequately appropriating that money?

GONZALES: That is what Ms. Davis said, yes, sir.

MILES: And if you don't accept this amendment, you're aware that you're possibly opening us up to a lawsuit—the great State of Texas, opening us up to the same type of lawsuit that could cost this state additional funds over \$125 million. Are you aware of that?

GONZALES: That is what Ms. Davis said, yes, sir.

MILES: Are you saying that is not true?

GONZALES: I'm going by what Ms. Davis told us.

MILES: Are you saying that's not true?

GONZALES: I'm going by what Ms. Davis told us, Representative Miles.

MILES: If it is actual truth, would you like to subject the State of Texas to a lawsuit, such as that nature?

GONZALES: The difficulty, Mr. Miles, is that the way this money is going, it is going to an agency which has absolutely no authority to deal with that money, and the monies will be swept again. There is no authority there.

MILES: Doesn't her amendment give us the authority to put it in the right place?

GONZALES: No, sir. It goes to the Department of Housing and Community Affairs, which does not have the authority to do anything with that money.

MILES: Don't they have the right to do the program that the federal government has required us to do with this money? Does that particular agency have the ability to do what the federal government has specified us to do with that money when they sent it here?

GONZALES: No, sir.

MILES: It does not?

GONZALES: It does not.

MILES: Tell me why it doesn't.

GONZALES: The Department of Housing and Community Affairs, Representative Miles, does not have the authority to do anything with that money.

MILES: Are we not allowing them to do that through this legislation?

GONZALES: No, sir, I don't believe we are.

MILES: Tell me why we're not.

GONZALES: Because they don't have that authority. This is not granting that authority.

MILES: I understand what you're saying that they don't have it right now. Aren't we doing that through this piece of legislation, through this amendment?

GONZALES: No, sir.

MILES: Don't we have a bill in this house that will do that?

GONZALES: Ms. Davis has-

MILES: Do you know any bill in this house that will allow our housing department to do what the federal government has asked us to do with this money?

GONZALES: Ms. Davis has a bill—

MILES: To make the citizens of the State of Texas, who took part in predatory lending and were scammed and ripped off by lenders, to make their lives right and correct. People who are homeless—some of these people that are homeless at this point in time in their lives.

GONZALES: Ms. Davis has a bill—

MILES: I didn't ask you what Ms. Davis did. I asked you, do we have a bill in this house that would allow our housing department to do what the federal government has asked us to do with this money? Yes or no?

GONZALES: Are you asking me is there is a piece of legislation pending in the committee process somewhere which will allow Housing and Community Affairs to do just this?

MILES: That's exactly what I'm asking you, sir.

GONZALES: I have no idea. I can tell you they cannot do it now, and to put it here now doesn't do us any good. They can't do anything with it, Mr. Miles.

Y. DAVIS: Is that like any other legislation that we have filed to give the authority to an agency to put a program together? Isn't it true that we often file legislation, or an amendment to pending legislation, with regard to giving them the responsibility to implement a program? That's not an unusual approach, is it?

GONZALES: That would be a contingency rider, I believe you're asking about, and all contingency riders are going to Article XI.

Y. DAVIS: No, all contingencies don't go to Article XI. But isn't it true that we typically have legislation that is pending and that we allocate or send money to that agency to do a certain type of program? Isn't that normal?

GONZALES: Again, yes, ma'am, that would be a contingency rider because right now they cannot do this.

Y. DAVIS: Second of all, you indicated that I was sending it to something that was outside of an agency. What would that be, because I don't recall having that part of my legislation. Is that something that you just kind of made up?

GONZALES: No, ma'am. It was my understanding that—and please correct me if this is wrong—my understanding was you were sending it to one of the SDSI agencies, the mortgage agency, which is not in the bill pattern. If that is incorrect, I certainly stand corrected.

Y. DAVIS: That's not correct.

REMARKS ORDERED PRINTED

Representative Rose moved to print all remarks on Amendment No. 227.

The motion prevailed.

Representative Gonzales moved to table Amendment No. 227, as amended.

Y. DAVIS: This is an issue that we need to deal with now or we'll be dealing with it later. We took a settlement, you know, and since I've been here we've been very careful that when we tell people that we are going to do something-if we collect a tax for the assistance, actually what the tax is going to be used for. This is a settlement that came to this state as a result of citizens being harmed. It has specific directions as how to use these settlement dollars. We've ignored that as the State of California did, who's currently in a lawsuit. It is in a lawsuit right now because they chose not to do what these funds were directed to do. What I'm only trying to do is save this state from making the mistake of taking these federal funds and doing things other than what they were designed to do. They were designed to provide relief for citizens who were harmed with predatory lending. If we don't do this, this amendment, you will see it again because we will be talking about funding the AG for this lawsuit. I'd ask you to vote no on the motion to table so that we don't put our state in harm's way toward a lawsuit pending that we know we've taken the funds and we know we've misused them or we're not using them correctly. So I'd ask you to vote no on the motion to table.

(a)(1) It is the intent of the legislature that the University of Houston shall, at a minimum, make a good faith effort to seek to increase its Historically Underutilized Businesses (HUB) contracting at a range of at least 10 percent to 20 percent, in each of the procurement categories when the institution establishes its HUB goals.

(2)(a) It is the intent of the legislature that the University of Houston appropriated funds under this Act report to the Comptroller of Public Accounts, the members of the House Appropriations and Senate Finance Committee, Speaker of the House, Lieutenant Governor, and the Legislative Budget Board, by December 31, 2015, the university's efforts to comply with this section. An institution shall also make an annual report of its findings by December 31st for each fiscal year of the 2016-17 biennium.

(b) When seeking to attain the increased HUB goal under Subsection (a)(1) of this section, it is the intent of the legislature that the University of Houston shall make a good faith effort to give greater priority to each subcategory of economically disadvantaged person, as named under Section 2161.001(3)(A)(i)

through Section 2161.001(3)(A)(vi), Government Code, for which the university has awarded less than 30 percent of HUB contracts - as measured by total dollars spent for contracts with all HUBs between Fiscal Years 2010 to 2014.

(c) It is the intent of the legislature that the University of Houston shall, in addition to the requirements of Section 2161.123 of the Texas Government Code, make a good faith effort to add to the university's strategic plan, at a minimum, the following:

(1) strategy for contracting with new HUB vendors in order to expand its HUB base;

(2) provide an ethnic breakdown of women certified HUB contracts;

(3) not make any decreases to the number of HUB contracts that were previously awarded;

(4) provide guidelines for enforcement of the HUB program;

(5) identify any discriminatory practices or marketplace barriers that adversely affect contract participation by HUB;

(6) develop programs to remedy or reduce the effects of any identified discriminatory practices or marketplace barriers that adversely affect contract participation of HUB; and

(7) provide a detailed summary of its HUB outreach efforts, which includes requiring prime contractors to document their outreach efforts and provide reasons why prime contractors may have rejected qualified HUB that were the low-bidding subcontractors.

(d) It is the intent of the legislature that the University of Houston shall, when developing the strategic plan under Subsection (c) of this section, give priority to an economically disadvantaged person, as defined by Section 2161.001(3), of the Texas Government Code, whose average percentage of total dollars spent with HUB between Fiscal Years 2010 to 2014 is less than 20 percent.

REASONS FOR VOTE

Although I support gains made in various goals and strategies in this bill, I oppose cuts to crime victim compensation, historical preservation, arts education grants, adult basic education and literacy, unemployment compensation, state emergency preparedness, SNAP benefits, and other important programs and services.

Guillen

CSHB 1 did not properly fund infrastructure and priority items such as transportation, DPS aircraft for border security, and creating a permanent fix to TRS-Care. We should have prioritized education spending better. Our educators deserve a quality, long-term solution to their health care needs. We did not cut needless spending of taxpayer dollars from programs which are not the proper role of government. **CSHB 1** increased general revenue expenditures by approximately 10 percent, exceeding population plus inflation.

Tinderholt

While I respect the hard work of Chairman Otto and the Appropriations Committee members to create **CSHB 1**, I had to vote against the proposed budget. **CSHB 1** offers a troubling spending plan for Texas. I made a commitment to my constituents to decrease the scope of government and end wasteful state spending.

In **CSHB 1**, transportation funding does not tie to highway projects and long-term funding for TRS-Care was not resolved. Even more concerning, border security funding is limited, particularly in the areas of overtime pay for DPS officers and funds requested for aircraft for increased surveillance were not granted. I am also concerned that **CSHB 1** appropriates too much to unnecessary initiatives and not enough to vital needs.

Throughout the **CSHB 1** deliberations, I worked to vote in ways that would provide more transparency and address the growth of government. I successfully added a provision that ensures abstinence education funding mandated by the federal government can only be used for abstinence education. Unfortunately, at the end of the deliberations, key budget areas were not adequately addressed which led me to vote against the bill.
