MOTION TO SUSPEND FIVE-DAY POSTING RULE

Representative Coleman moved to suspend the five-day posting rule to allow the Committee on County Affairs to consider **HB 1654** and **HB 2310** at 10:30 a.m. or upon final adjournment/recess Thursday, March 23 in E2.026.

REPRESENTATIVE LEACH: Representative Coleman, can you tell us specifically what these bills are regarding?

REPRESENTATIVE COLEMAN: This is **HB 1654** by Oliverson and is related to the "offense of the failure to comply with an order from the fire marshal and the authority of certain county employees to issue citations for certain violations."

What he's explained to me is that there are places where you might have two jurisdictions, and in those two jurisdictions, each person gives the individual a warning but nobody ever cites the individual for those particular violations, and this is to cure that. So it will be a public hearing. They're not voting on it or anything; it's a public hearing.

LEACH: You're moving to suspend the five-day posting rule to allow a hearing on this on what day?

COLEMAN: It's this Thursday upon first adjournment and during reading and referral of bills, along with the other posted hearings. The other bill is by Muñoz and it's "relating to authorizing the county clerk to conduct a marriage ceremony and collect a related fee; authorizing a fee." And it's bracketed to his area. We have another bill that's of the very same topic, and so it is better to have bills of the same subject matter on the same day, and they were ready to be heard. The authors were ready to have these bills heard, and they asked if we would post them. I thought it would be better to hear them now, particularly next week. Since we meet on Thursdays, we end up doing the Appropriations bill and the supplemental bill; we'll get behind.

PARLIAMENTARY INQUIRY

LEACH: Mr. Speaker, I do want to ask a few questions regarding suspension of the rules. I'd like to clarify under Rule 14, Section 3, can any member of this body move to suspend the rules?

SPEAKER STRAUS: The answer is yes.

LEACH: So with respect to a motion to suspend the five-day posting rule, who can bring that motion, Mr. Speaker?

SPEAKER: That would be the chairman of the committee, Mr. Leach.

LEACH: Mr. Speaker, can any of the rules be suspended? In other words, is there any rule in our rulebook that cannot be suspended by a motion of any member?

SPEAKER: Mr. Leach, the answer is yes.

LEACH: Okay, and just to be clear, under Rule 14, Section 5, a standing rule of the house may be suspended by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, correct?

SPEAKER: That's correct.

LEACH: Rule 14, Section 4 is regarding the required notice for any motion to suspend the rules. Mr. Speaker, can you explain the notice requirements regarding a suspension of the rules as outlined in Rule 14, Section 4, specifically with respect to the one-hour notice?

SPEAKER: Mr. Leach, I'll ask the clerk to read the rule to you.

LEACH: So Mr. Speaker, under Rule 14, Section 4, it's my understanding, and correct me if I'm wrong, that the chair cannot allow a suspension of the rules unless and until a one-hour notice is given to the members, correct?

SPEAKER: Mr. Leach, that's incorrect.

LEACH: Okay, that rule can be suspended by unanimous consent, correct?

SPEAKER: That's correct.

LEACH: Frequently, there are motions to suspend the rules, Mr. Speaker, that we vote on without the one-hour notice.

SPEAKER: That's correct.

LEACH: It's my understanding that within the past 10 years, this might have been done in upwards of 670 times without the one-hour notice.

SPEAKER: Mr. Leach, it would be 681 times.

LEACH: I appreciate that. Based on my conversations with the parliamentarian, that's because we have frequently moved to suspend all necessary rules in addition to the motion to suspend the five-day posting rule. So in other words, Mr. Speaker, when we suspend all necessary rules, are we, in fact, suspending the one-hour notice requirement?

SPEAKER: Restate the question.

LEACH: Unless a member moves to suspend all necessary rules, which would include the one-hour notice requirement, if there's a pending motion to suspend the rules and a member objects, is the one-hour notice by default required to the members of this body?

SPEAKER: With unanimous consent we can take up actions right away.

LEACH: I'm trying to understand here, and I don't have a problem with Representative Coleman's motion to suspend the five-day posting. I haven't heard an objection, but I do want to clarify going forward, Mr. Speaker. If we want to require the one-hour notice—in other words, if there's a pending motion and a member of this body objects and wants one hour to consider the content of the motion—how would we make that objection?

SPEAKER: Mr. Leach, you would object. Mr. Leach, there have been 681 suspensions on the posting rule and 1,029 on permission to meet and 6,300 suspensions on other resolutions. You are free to object on any one of them.

LEACH: I appreciate you clarifying the rules for us. If a member moves to suspend the five-day posting rule as Chairman Coleman has done and any member of this body objects, is the chair required to give the body one-hour notice before a vote on the suspension of the five-day posting rule?

SPEAKER: Mr. Leach, a member would have to request one-hour notice.

LEACH: Rule 14, Section 4, regarding the one-hour notice, says that the rule may be suspended only by unanimous consent. Therefore, if a member objects to the motion to suspend, is that not by its very nature not unanimous consent?

SPEAKER: Mr. Coleman was requesting unanimous consent to take up his motion and to approve it. Members can agree with one part of his motion and not the with other.

LEACH: Did Mr. Coleman, and I might have missed this, did Mr. Coleman move to suspend all necessary rules or just to suspend the five-day notice rule?

SPEAKER: Mr. Leach, just as in the normal routine suspension, he did both.

LEACH: Okay, so when we vote to suspend the rules—suspend the posting rule—we're thereby suspending the one-hour notice requirement as well. I just want to make clear, so we understand what exactly it is we're voting on.

SPEAKER: Thank you, Mr. Leach. Feel free to object.
